The St. Johns River, Southwest Florida and South Florida Water Management Districts are working with stakeholders and other interested parties to develop an updated 2020 Regional Water Supply Plan for the Central Florida Water Initiative (CFWI) region. As part of this effort, the Districts are currently requesting input from stakeholders in the Central Florida region on potential water supply, water resource development, and water conservation project options.

The goal of this process is to develop a list of project options and concepts to meet the region's water supply needs and the water needs of regional natural systems.
