- Native plants (www.fnps.org/plants) Pollinator plants and butterflies (www.fnps.org/plants/butterflies) Bees (http://ow.ly/yHDk50AIMBZ) State tree: Sabal Palm State wildflower: Coreopsis State butterfly: zebra longwing State bird: Mockingbird Native mammal Waterwise techniques Rain barrel Microirrigation (this can take many forms) Turf alternative (Perennial peanut, Asiatic jasmine, Sensitive briar, etc.) Less than 50% turfgrass Drought-tolerant turf like Bahia grass Trees providing greater than 50% shade to landscape
